From Your Parish Council... Keep up to date with what's going on in Flitton, Greenfield and Wardhedges, especially during these unusual times...

Writing this in August 2021, I am pleased that we now seem to have the virus much more under control and all our Parish Council services have returned to normal. Of course, the virus still represents a serious risk and we should all stay cautious to protect ourselves and others. The Parish Council is holding meetings in person again at the Church Hall and if anyone wants to take part or let us know about something, please feel free to turn up after checking the dates and an agenda on our website. https://flittonandgreenfieldparishcouncil.gov.uk/

I still get the feeling that people in the community do not believe they are well informed about the Parish Council role or the services we provide and fund. All this information is held on the website and I do strongly advise everyone to check it out and subscribe to receive email updates. We keep the website up to date and include news from Central Beds Council – for instance Planning Appeal decisions, road closures and most of the press releases. This way you can keep right up to date with what is happening around you.

At our last meeting we began talking about how we may get involved with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Weekend in 2022 (Thursday 2nd to Sunday 5th June). Her Majesty will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, and there will be an extended bank holiday for communities to come together to celebrate the historic milestone. We are thinking about taking part in the annual Big Jubilee Lunch on Sunday 5th June, so if anyone would like to contribute as part of a small group - food and fun with neighbours, street parties or a large picnic, do let us know (clerk@flittonandgreenfieldparishcouncil.gov.uk) as we want it to be a real community effort.

We are also pleased that extra work on the river path has now been made possible, mainly as a result of funding by the Parish Council. The end of Mill Lane has been re-surfaced and work is scheduled to take place in Brook Lane to avoid the stretch of mud which appears in wetter months. There will also be bollards installed at the Mill Lane end to prevent unauthorised vehicular access. The Council is commissioning signage for the path which will be called 'The Vincent Austin Way' and officially launched later this year. You will be able to read more on our website nearer the time.

I am also pleased to be able to inform you that two new benches have been ordered to be placed near/along the river (Greenfield end) and these should be installed soon. Plus, we are also having the village Festival of Britain signs restored as they were getting quite worn. I noticed today that the signs have gone, but by the time you read this they should look like new and be re-installed.

We are delighted with the wild flower verges in Flitton and Greenfield and feel the experiment has been well received with many people expressing their appreciation. We hope to expand the scheme further next year into more areas including the playing field. Look out for details on the website or in the next edition of Flit'n'More.

A Message from the Vicar

The Falling Leaves

A day of rain, a fall in temperature, and the first one has fallen on what loosely passes for lawn at the Vicarage. I'm talking leaves, and if you think I'm introducing the motif depressingly early, bear in mind I heard my first Christmas song this year on June 25th.

Anyway, where was I? Looking for the rake, that's where I was. As a martyr to Sciatica I have to profess a certain immunity to the romance of autumn. This is due almost entirely to the amount of leaves that seem to have come my way. In a previous place I once calculated that 300,000 leaves fell on my garden in an hour. Still, as a park-keeper once told me, 'you only have to pick each one up once...'

Every year, the Festival of Remembrance at the Albert Hall ends with a cascade of poppy petals bearing tribute to the fallen and the lost. As a small boy I would single out one petal and assign it to the memory of the Grandfather I never met, reflecting on how many others must have been similarly affected.

The onset of autumn has a natural resonance with the task of remembering, tapping into the rhythm of the seasons and illustrating themes of loss, harvest and hope. These same changing patterns of nature were a rich



resource for the teaching of Jesus, who contrasted the fleeting beauty of nature to the permanence of His Father's love, and likened his own life to a grain of wheat falling into the ground and dying but producing new and abundant life.

Mirrored in the experience of individuals, communities and nations lies the possibility that sometimes things must die to bring new life, hope and growth. Ask any gardener. The dying of autumn prepares for the glory of spring, when even grizzled leaf-rakers like me are heartened by the green shoots that announce another season.

And so I will tell myself that all around me is a reminder of the pattern of dying and rising, of hope and new life, and I will resolve to treat the Vicarage lawn as a symbol of those things, such that whilst my back may be aching my heart may still be glad.

Sunday 14th November, 10.30am outside Flitton Church Act of Remembrance



The Flit'n'More Thank You Pages

In this issue we remember Vincent Austin, who died a few months ago, and who gave so much service to this community in so many ways.

Proud father, grandfather, great grandfather and husband, Vincent Austin spent many years living with his wife Joan and their family at the Old Vicarage in Flitton before moving in 2006 to Suffolk, where he passed away peacefully a few months ago. Vincent continued to be as active as he possibly could until the very last, his scooter becoming a familiar sight in the streets of Southwold!

He will be sadly missed and fondly remembered by many in Flitton and Greenfield, having given so much of his time here to helping the local



community in every way he could. Vincent was never a man to do things by halves, and his enthusiastic involvement in just about everything he set his mind to not only made him a much respected member of this community but also imbued every aspect of his life, personal and professional.

Vincent was born in 1929 in Northhamptonshire. He attended Wellingborough Grammar School and Technical College, and initially worked in farming and engineering, despite early ambitions to become an artist. All these would feature heavily in his later life. After National Service, where he developed his skills in vehicle engineering and metal work, in the early 1950's he designed (and even patented!) agricultural equipment, and even found time to train as a registered silversmith. He also published several books.



But he had always yearned to work in developing countries, and after gaining a degree from LSE he eventually took a job as a lecturer in agricultural engineering at Silsoe College, hoping that this would lead to opportunites abroad — which it did!

And so in 1967 the Austin family moved into the Old Vicarage in Flitton. Despite working abroad for extended periods, Vincent and Joan still threw themselves fully into village life, and quickly became involved with the church and community. It would take a whole book (and a fascinating one!) to describe Vincent's career but maybe this sample of just some of the countries where he worked will paint the picture; Peru, Panama, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) Nigeria, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Greece, Papua New Guinea, Mexico... the list goes on.

All the more amazing then, that Vincent still managed to be so involved in village life throughout all his years in Flitton. He became a Churchwarden in the early 1980s, and remained on the PCC for many years. In 1990 when the diocese was planning to get rid of the Church Hall it is no exaggeration to say that had it not been for the input of Vincent there would no longer be a Church Hall in Flitton. With the blessing of the Vicar and PCC, he set up the management committee, which stills runs the building to this day, and was its first chairman, driving fundraising which enabled many of the improvements we enjoy today. In 1995 he was elected as an independent District Councillor, and later served on the Parish Council where he became chair in 1998. He was also a foundation governor of Greenfield School (where he also volunteered to teach Design Technology) becoming chair of the governors in 1999. On a lighter note, few can forget the close relationship that Vincent had with Father Christmas, persuading him to turn up at many children's parties over the years(!)



Somehow in all this frenetic activity, Vincent finally managed to fulfill his long-held dream of taking up painting in a serious way, and many a wall in the village is graced by his pictures, many of which he generously donated to fund-raising events. More recently, he was chair of the Southwold Art Circle. There he also joined the Bowls Club, Golf Club and Sailor's Reading Room, to name but a few. Vincent and Joan also gained an award for Southwold's best beach hut!

From Bedfordshire to Bangladesh, Vincent had that rare quality of making everyone he met feel valued, and that's possibly because to him, they were.



Our team of DBS checked volunteers all live in the villages that we cover (Flitton, Greenfield, Pulloxhill and Wardhedges) and have a willingness to give up their time to assist others, something which has become ever more prevalent over the recent weeks. In fact, our usual 14 volunteers have over doubled by temporary volunteers who have joined us to assist with the increase in demand during this difficult period.

During the Coronavirus situation, we have been busy picking up prescriptions and getting shopping for residents who are self isolating. Normally, our main tasks involve providing lifts to medical appointments or to the shops, but with social distancing, this simply isn't possible at the moment.

There are several ways that you can get in touch with us. We have a dedicated mobile phone number which is manned 7 days a week (07594 578 741) and a Facebook page where you can send us a request for assistance through Facebook Messenger. We also have an email address where you can contact us (info@good-neighbours.org.uk).

Our group is funded by donations from those we assist and by the reasonable charges we make for lifts which covers the volunteer's fuel and a small donation to our scheme. We are also very fortunate that the Flitton & Greenfield Parish Council have made donations to our scheme to assist us in buying equipment needed and to help cover our modest running costs.



FOOTPATH VOLUNTEERS

As well as working at Flitton Moor and its barn, the 'Friends of Flitton Moor' also work on our local footpaths.

Flitton Moor

We are a small band of 8 regular volunteers with occasional help from others. As we are all retired we usually work on footpaths on weekday mornings once a week – usually Tuesdays. During spring and

summer we are mostly clearing vegetation, and 5 of us are trained in the use of brushcutters on Rights of Way. We are funded and insured by Central Bedfordshire Council.

Over the last two winters we also installed several new bridges replacing the old sleepers. We have also changed most of the stiles in the parish to kissing gates.

VILLAGE HISTORY BY MARGARET BUTT

7th Earl Cowper 1834-1905

Thomas Phillip, Earl de Grey inherited the Wrest estate in 1833, and he had the means to build a modern replacement to the old house. The foundation stone of the present house was laid in 1834, the year that his grandson Francis, later 7th Earl Cowper (see right) was born. He was educated at Harrow and Christ Church College, Oxford.

The 7th Earl inherited the estate in 1880 from his mother, Anne Florence Cowper, 7th Baroness Lucas and daughter of Thomas Phillip. Thomas Phillip had no surviving sons so the De Grey title was passed onto a distant male relative. The Lucas title, however, could be passed down the female line. Francis' father was George Cowper, the 6th Earl so his son obtained both titles, becoming the 7th Earl Cowper, 8th Baron Lucas and also 4th Lord Dingwall and Lord Butler of Moore Park.




The Cowper estates were in various parts of the country including Melbourne Hall in Derbyshire, Panshanger in Hertfordshire and St James's Square, London. The total acreage he owned was 37,869 acres and he was extremely wealthy.

The 7th Earl Cowper was a Liberal politician who spoke regularly in the House of Lords, opposing Home Rule for Ireland. In 1870, he married Katie [Katrine] Compton, the eldest daughter of the Marquess of Northamptonshire. She was considerably younger than the Earl and there were no children. She appears to have been caring and hard working, visiting the poor in Flitton and Silsoe but she was strongly opposed to women's suffrage.

Katie was a noted society hostess and claimed that she invented the Country House Weekend. Her parties at St James's Square were famous but the weekends at Wrest and Panshanger were the most sought after. At this time, society was divided; the Marlborough House set, led by the Prince of Wales, later Edward VII, was devoted to horse racing and gambling. The Cowpers, Wyndhams, Tennants and Grenfells were part of The Souls set who were intelligent, wealthy, often related, men and women who met on equal terms and formed the core of the country house weekends. At Wrest they would perform plays, play Scrabble in German, have political discussions and hold shooting weekends which were very popular.

Visitors included politicians, army leaders, diplomats, financial leaders and members of the aristocracy, all with their wives and servants. Where did they all sleep at Wrest? The house was not large with 8 bedrooms on the first floor and maybe one more on the ground floor.



The development of the Country House weekend was only possible with the growth of railways. Visitors to Wrest could have arrived at Ampthill or Shefford Stations. As time went on and cars became more reliable, no doubt many visitors arrived that way.

After Francis died [his will was worth £1,079,000] the title Earl Cowper became extinct because he had no male heirs. He and Katie died of bronchitis, the Earl in 1905 and the Countess in 1913. Wrest Park was no longer needed by the family and was rented out to Mr Whitelaw Reid (pictured left) who managed to get King Edward VII to stay for the weekend at Wrest in 1909.
